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GAMES THE BOARDERS PLAY! BY SUSAN PERROW

3.15 and school is out. The 240 non-boarders climb onto school buses or walk out the gate and down the road, heading for their homes in Ongata Rongai and the surrounding hills and valleys.

But the Mbagathi boarders, 90 of them in total, including the 16 'African Leaf' children, stay on at the school. How do they fill their spare time you may wonder, five afternoons a week?

I was privileged to spend some days at the school in July this year and one of my favourite experiences was the afternoon 'down time'. After a quick drink and snack for afternoon tea, the children would run out into the gardens and fields to 'play'. I joined in the less energetic games (eg. ping pong) then would sit and watch the more energetic ones jump-elastics, hopscotch, string ball, skipping, rope climbing and soccer. I was continually amazed at how 90 children, aged 5 to 16 years, kept themselves amused for hours each afternoon with what is rapidly

becoming known in our western culture as 'old fashioned' games.

Some of the younger children, with a makeshift 'aeroplane' (made from a leaf impaled on the end of a short stick), had continual races back and forwards across the grass, holding their fastly rotating 'leaf motors' in the air above their heads. I tried unsuccessfully several times to get one going, but reached the other side of the playground without a single turn of my leaf – much to the amusement of the children!

The older girls, like many around the world, sometimes would experiment with hair do's and clothing. They would sit patiently having their braids redone, often only a few each day, with it taking more than a week for a complete change of hair-do. Others enjoyed swapping and mix-and-matching their clothing. One afternoon some of the girls were huddled under an acacia bush – I wandered over and found them looking for short lengths of thorn to put in their ears to keep their pierced holes

open. 'How did they pierce them in the beginning?' I asked. 'The African way', they laughed, 'with a very sharp thorn'. Then off they ran, it was time to help prepare the tables for the evening meal. I watched them singing and dancing as they wiped down table tops and set out 90 bowls and 90 cups - even this work was undertaken with the joy of a game.

What a privilege to be around such creativity and simplicity. Not a computer game or mobile phone anywhere on campus! It was World –cup fever at the time, with the world's best players competing further south on the African continent in Cape Town. I sometimes overheard the children discussing the matches, but when I asked if they could listen on a radio to the progress of the game, the answer was – 'oh no, we just read the results the next day in the newspaper'. Then one boy added, 'anyway, we would rather be playing the game, not sitting listening to it!'



MANNA FROM HEAVEN!

Thanks to a contact of Eva and her partner Paul, we were put in touch with the right people at DHL who made us a generous offer of 4 consignments per year weighing up to 50 kg – free of charge.

We have already taken advantage of DHL's offer and our first consignment ... 3 boxes of children's clothing ... has been shipped and has arrived at the Mbagathi Steiner School in Nairobi. The clothing was given to the LEAF children as well as any other children at the school in need of clothing. Some baby clothes in the shipment have gone to babies in need at the local health clinic.

DHL's offer was a godsend and the LEAF children were absolutely delighted to receive the clothes and shoes.

The clothing was given to us by Nga Nguyen who collected it from members of her Linh Son Vietnamese Temple community at Darra in Brisbane.

So, we send a big THANK YOU to DHL for their very generous offer, to their staff - for their helpful assistance and to Nga Nguyen and her friends for their generous donation of the clothing.

NEW VERANDAH FOR SAINTS OF HOPE

With some generous donations this year we have been able to build a verandah for the African LEAF supported Saints of Hope Day Care Centre in the Kawangware slum. Three metres wide by six metres long, it extends off the kitchen door, making a perfect dining room for the children, and a sheltered place for bags and shoes.



With the Food Program now in full swing, the verandah has tables and benches for 25 children (half the group) to sit for meals in rostered time slots.

Having this extra space has greatly improved the quality of the teaching program – the inside rooms can now be used for work

and play, without the interruptions of having to turn them into improvised dining rooms twice a day.

The staff and children are very happy.
